Super Neighborhood 17 – Eldridge/West Oaks Meeting Minutes from May 10, 2023, 7:00 PM

- **I. Call to Order** President, Jeff Baker called the meeting to order with a quorum.
- **II. Public Safety** Officer Tim Whitaker summarized the April crime report for SN-17, as compared to March (*see crime stats*).

When it comes to auto thefts, the numbers are [artificially] higher than they would otherwise be, given the success of flock cameras, which have caused an increase in "outside" recoveries. These are vehicles recovered in a different city from which they were stolen. "Outside" vehicles recovered in Houston add to Houston's auto theft totals.

Since the state is cracking down on temporary [paper] plates, there has been an increase in stolen plates. Car thieves are known to swap plates from a stolen vehicle with plates from a car of the same make and model. Periodically *check to make sure that the plates on your car are the correct ones*. Replacing the original screws with anti-theft screws serves as a practical deterrent; they are widely available, and easy to install.

There was a question about squatters living in abandoned homes, and whether an HOA can put "no trespassing" or "private property" signs on these houses. The question is under investigation.

The next **PIP** (Positive Interaction Program) **meeting is on Thursday, May 18** at the HPD Westside Station, 3203 S. Dairy Ashford. This month's topic is **traffic enforcement**.

III. Guest Speaker – Jennifer Thomas, Clinician, Metro CARE division, with Officer Ashley Hurst, METRO Police Department (MPD)

The MPD CARE unit is a specialized team of Metro Police Officers and Mental Health Clinicians who engage in street outreach to the homeless, particularly along bus/rail routes. The program has been up and running for one year, and so far, is only a four-person unit - two METRO police officers and two mental health clinicians.

The process includes $\underline{\mathbf{C}}$ risis $\underline{\mathbf{A}}$ ssessment $\underline{\mathbf{R}}$ esponse and $\underline{\mathbf{E}}$ ngagement. METRO reaches out to its community partners including crisis and drop-in centers, meal providers, housing agencies, and health care centers that offer specialized services based on an assessment of individual needs.

In the cases of a crisis, the unit comes in to deescalate the situation. They do not write citations or take people to jail, but rather work to build trust. That can often take several visits.

The division works to get individuals the specialized services they need. There is a long waiting list for permanent housing, so the CARE team looks for temporary housing. Housing placement requires regular check in with a case manager. Individuals who refuse housing services may only want some items – food, clothing, toiletries, transportation, an I.D., or a phone (Cricket provides free government phones to those who qualify) – which METRO helps provide.

MPD's CARE division works in close coordination with HPD's Homeless Outreach Team. **METRO's** dispatch # is: 713 615-7581.
